WITNESS TO HISTORY – PERSONAL ACCOUNTS OF MILITARY SERVICE

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

(All Grades)

This unique program enables students to interact with a veteran or a member of the Canadian Armed Forces, who will share their personal experiences and perspectives. Volunteers representing a variety of conflicts and service areas are available (Afghanistan, domestic operations, and service abroad with international organizations such as NATO, NORAD or the UN). Volunteers also come from a range of trades and professions. While every effort will be made to match groups with their preferred choice, the final selection will be based on volunteer availability. Requests for this program must be made at least three weeks in advance. *Moderated by a Museum staff member*.

BEFORE THE PROGRAM

It is very helpful to encourage your students to think of appropriate questions in advance. You may choose to share the questions with your Museum contact up to 24 hours before the start of your program, though it is not required. We've put together some pointers for crafting good questions.

- Review the volunteer's biography and consider the historical events they have witnessed.
- Reflect on broad, relatable topics such as being far from home, the volunteer's motivation for joining the military, or further details on their role.
- Please remind your students that it is not appropriate to ask if the volunteer has killed anyone. Our
 volunteers are not always comfortable fielding this question. If your students have that sort of
 interest, consider redirecting them to more open-ended questions that will allow the volunteer more
 flexibility to answer how they see fit. For example, "What are some of the hardest things you have
 done?"
